Young workers experience some of the highest rates of job-related injuries and illnesses,

often leading to lost time, workers' compensation claims, and long-term consequences. In many cases, these injuries stem from inexperience, lack of training, and unfamiliarity with workplace hazards. Join state and regional safety professionals for a dynamic and interactive workshop focused on addressing the unique occupational health risks young workers face in today's fast-evolving workplace.

Key learning objectives

- Review the role of OSHA and how weakened regulations impact young workers' safety
- Define workers' rights and explore how well young workers understand their rights and how we can better educate them
- · List employer responsibilities to ensure safety and well-being of their youngest employees
